**Pastor's Message** 



My Great Aunt Ruth is someone I have few memories of. I remember she would come over on Christmas morning, and I remember she would come for my birthday party. Unfortunately, a stroke and some other challenges rendered her bedridden in a nursing home, and I was too young to go visit. But what I do have is plenty of stories that the family would tell about Aunt Ruth, many of them revolving around how, shall we say, frugal she was. She would reuse plastic utensils, she would tear napkins in two so there could be twice as many, and the stories went on. They were always good-natured stories about her quirks, but suffice it to say I knew that if there was a penny to be pinched, Aunt Ruth was the type to pinch it. As an adult I know why, she had lived through the great depression and learned a lesson or two about the value of being frugal. Here she was 50 years after the end of the depression, and she was still living her life with those lessons in mind. I've thought of Aunt Ruth a lot as we have reached the two year anniversary of this pandemic, I've wondered what lessons we will take away from those years. Since Lent is a time for reflection it seems appropriate to do so. The verse I keep thinking of is:

> Rend your heart and not your garments. Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love, and he relents from sending calamity. Joel 2:13

These words were written while the people of Israel were dealing with a plague of their own, a plague of locusts. A drought and a locust infestation left the population hungry and desperate. Many of the people turned away from God. They felt that God had done this to them and so they were looking to other sources for answers. Joel was encouraging them to turn back to God to find their answers in him: their comfort, their security, their hope. During Lent we are called to return as well. It isn't locusts or drought that caused us to drift away but the other challenges that life offers. These past two years we have had many challenges: loneliness, uncertainty, health concerns, changing rules and structures, and the list goes on. Joel's words are for us. God is gracious, merciful, compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love. Find your answers, your hope, and whatever else you need in God.

This is when I'm reminded of my Aunt, because the changes stirred up in her in the 1930's continued until the 1990's. I'm not one to speculate on how these years will have changed us and society at large, but I'm sure it will have changed us. So perhaps the reflection isn't about what changes we will see. I'm sure those in the 30's weren't thinking about washing plastic utensils, but rather the point is that no matter what lies ahead, we should be reminded to return to the Lord. When the weight of the world pulls us away, we return. For Joel the challenges were locusts, and for us its a different kind of plague, but this lent, let us return to the LORD all the same.

### **Mission Message**



<u>ENTERTAINING ANGELS</u> by Marcia Brown, mission interpreter



Be not forgetful to entertain strangers: for thereby some have entertained angels unawares. Hebrews 13:2

The United States is resettling 75,000 Afghans. Chances are your town is welcoming one or more families. The Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS) is playing a major role in making this happen. In fact, the need is so great that an extra office of LIRS has recently opened in Virginia, an office staffed by Afghans, many of whom recently arrived themselves, wanting to help with those countrymen who are still coming. But please don't call them refugees. Because of the circumstances of their departure, they are being referred to as "allies" or "neighbors." These families have experienced massive trauma, and most come here with only a backpack of their belongings, if that. LIRS makes sure they get a roof over their heads, food in their cupboards, and access to medical and mental health care. The organization helps the newly arrived Afghans acclimate to the culture, learn English, find affordable housing, secure furniture and culturally familiar food, enroll children in school, and find employment. LIRS will find foster families for children arriving alone. The new Virginia facility has an active homework club, teaches people to drive and fill out essential forms.

LIRS is an ELCA ministry. You are already helping this effort because of your mission support to the Synod. Thank you!


